





Beatty," Hastings said. "Those games were physical, but not one derogatory word was said by anybody on either side of the football."

Hastings sees sports as a chance to eliminate hate and focus on one goal.

"The differences in race, region, economics and politics just don't matter on the field of athletics," Hastings said. "And that's the way it should be."

Hastings received a golf scholarship to the University of Arkansas, where he lettered three times. He received the Northern Texas PGA Senior Tour Championship Amateur Champion and Player of the Year award in 2000 and 2001 and he is the seven-time club champion at the Waxahachie Country Club.

Huffstetler probably had the furthest trip of any of the honorees this year, but he brought a token of his appreciation from his home in Jonesboro, Ark. He awarded the key to the city of Jonesboro to Jordan after he introduced Huffstetler.

"This way next time you drive through town, you can feel free to stay a while," Huffstetler said to the mayor.

Huffstetler played for the Indians when they defeated Alvin and starting pitcher Nolan Ryan in the 1965 state title game. But despite that fact, the pitcher couldn't believe he made the first hall of fame class.

"I figured we've had so many other greats and I was shocked when I got the call," Huffstetler said. "I couldn't imagine or want to be in a better community than this one."

He went on to play basketball at Stephen F. Austin State University,

where he was an all-conference player and helped his team capture the NAIA championship in 1970.

Brian Waters is currently on the reserved roster for the New England Patriots and was unable to attend Thursday's dinner. But he was honored by his high school coach, Scott Phillips.

"The spring after Brian quit, he came back to me and asked if he could play football for me again," Phillips said. "I told him that I needed three reasons to let him back on the team, but once he said 'my life is better with football in it,' that was all I needed to hear and that's all you really need to know about Brian."

Waters was drafted by the Dallas Cowboys, but spent the bulk of his NFL career with the Kansas City Chiefs. He did play in Super Bowl XLVI for the Patriots last season. He has earned five Pro Bowl selections and in 2009, he received the Walter Payton Man of the Year award for his contributions on and off the field.

While Phillips was on stage, he honored his 1992 football team, of which only five players attended the event. Those players were Eric and David Farrar, Lamont Moore, Corey Crane and Joe Garber.

"I think those five players will be inducted individually into this hall of fame someday," Phillips said. "Nobody was selfish on that team. It was the greatest year I've ever had and I know they won't forget it. I know I won't."

That team went 16-0 and beat A&M Consolidated 28-24 at the Astrodome for the school's first, and so far, only state championship.

The final inductee was Brian Zettler, who was enshrined as a Friend of WHS athletics. He graduated in 1989 with letters in football, basketball,

baseball and track and field, but is more known for his efforts as a trainer.

"I was OK at sports. I wasn't as talented as any of the men who were already honored tonight," Zettler said. "But I'm here as a friend and I'm completely honored to be here."

He founded the Sports Medicine program at SAGU and established scholarships for WHS graduates and former athletes.

This is the first of what will become a yearly tradition as part of homecoming week. The hall of fame will eventually be located in the Waxahachie Civic Center, but that date is still uncertain.
